**FIRST AMENDED ACCUSATION**

15 **Physician's and Surgeon's Certificate**

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20 **PARTIES**

21 1. William Prasifka (Complainant) brings this First Amended Accusation solely in his  
22 official capacity as the Executive Director of the Medical Board of California, Department of  
23 Consumer Affairs (Board).

24 2. On or about August 1, 1997, the Medical Board issued Physician's and Surgeon's  
25 Certificate Number A 63159 to Kanagasabai Kanakeswaran, M.D. (Respondent). The Physician's  
26 and Surgeon's Certificate was in full force and effect at all times relevant to the charges brought  
27 herein. The Physician's and Surgeon's Certificate expired on November 30, 2020, and has not  
28 been renewed.



**JURISDICTION**

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2       3.    This First Amended Accusation is brought before the Board, under the authority of  
3 the following laws. All section references are to the Business and Professions Code (Code)  
4 unless otherwise indicated.

5       4.    Section 2227 of the Code states:

6           (a) A licensee whose matter has been heard by an administrative law judge of  
7 the Medical Quality Hearing Panel as designated in Section 11371 of the Government  
8 Code, or whose default has been entered, and who is found guilty, or who has entered  
9 into a stipulation for disciplinary action with the board, may, in accordance with the  
10 provisions of this chapter:

11           (1) Have his or her license revoked upon order of the board.

12           (2) Have his or her right to practice suspended for a period not to exceed one  
13 year upon order of the board.

14           (3) Be placed on probation and be required to pay the costs of probation  
15 monitoring upon order of the board.

16           (4) Be publicly reprimanded by the board. The public reprimand may include a  
17 requirement that the licensee complete relevant educational courses approved by the  
18 board.

19           (5) Have any other action taken in relation to discipline as part of an order of  
20 probation, as the board or an administrative law judge may deem proper.

21           (b) Any matter heard pursuant to subdivision (a), except for warning letters,  
22 medical review or advisory conferences, professional competency examinations,  
23 continuing education activities, and cost reimbursement associated therewith that are  
24 agreed to with the board and successfully completed by the licensee, or other matters  
25 made confidential or privileged by existing law, is deemed public, and shall be made  
26 available to the public by the board pursuant to Section 803.1.

27       5.    Section 2234 of the Code, states:

28           The board shall take action against any licensee who is charged with  
unprofessional conduct. In addition to other provisions of this article, unprofessional  
conduct includes, but is not limited to, the following:

          (a) Violating or attempting to violate, directly or indirectly, assisting in or  
abetting the violation of, or conspiring to violate any provision of this chapter.

          (b) Gross negligence.

          (c) Repeated negligent acts. To be repeated, there must be two or more  
negligent acts or omissions. An initial negligent act or omission followed by a  
separate and distinct departure from the applicable standard of care shall constitute  
repeated negligent acts.

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(1) An initial negligent diagnosis followed by an act or omission medically appropriate for that negligent diagnosis of the patient shall constitute a single negligent act.

(2) When the standard of care requires a change in the diagnosis, act, or omission that constitutes the negligent act described in paragraph (1), including, but not limited to, a reevaluation of the diagnosis or a change in treatment, and the licensee's conduct departs from the applicable standard of care, each departure constitutes a separate and distinct breach of the standard of care.

(d) Incompetence.

(e) The commission of any act involving dishonesty or corruption that is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of a physician and surgeon.

(f) Any action or conduct that would have warranted the denial of a certificate.

(g) The failure by a certificate holder, in the absence of good cause, to attend and participate in an interview by the board. This subdivision shall only apply to a certificate holder who is the subject of an investigation by the board.

6. Section 2236 of the Code states:

(a) The conviction of any offense substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of a physician and surgeon constitutes unprofessional conduct within the meaning of this chapter [Chapter 5, the Medical Practice Act]. The record of conviction shall be conclusive evidence only of the fact that the conviction occurred.

(b) The district attorney, city attorney, or other prosecuting agency shall notify the Medical Board of the pendency of an action against a licensee charging a felony or misdemeanor immediately upon obtaining information that the defendant is a licensee. The notice shall identify the licensee and describe the crimes charged and the facts alleged. The prosecuting agency shall also notify the clerk of the court in which the action is pending that the defendant is a licensee, and the clerk shall record prominently in the file that the defendant holds a license as a physician and surgeon.

(c) The clerk of the court in which a licensee is convicted of a crime shall, within 48 hours after the conviction, transmit a certified copy of the record of conviction to the board. The division may inquire into the circumstances surrounding the commission of a crime in order to fix the degree of discipline or to determine if the conviction is of an offense substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of a physician and surgeon.

(d) A plea or verdict of guilty or a conviction after a plea of nolo contendere is deemed to be a conviction within the meaning of this section and Section 2236.1. The record of conviction shall be conclusive evidence of the fact that the conviction occurred.

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7. Section 490 of the Code states:

(a) In addition to any other action that a board is permitted to take against a licensee, a board may suspend or revoke a license on the ground that the licensee has been convicted of a crime, if the crime is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of the business or profession for which the license was issued.

(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a board may exercise any authority to discipline a licensee for conviction of a crime that is independent of the authority granted under subdivision (a) only if the crime is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of the business or profession for which the licensee's license was issued.

(c) A conviction within the meaning of this section means a plea or verdict of guilty or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere. Any action that a board is permitted to take following the establishment of a conviction may be taken when the time for appeal has elapsed, or the judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal, or when an order granting probation is made suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under the provisions of Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code.

(d) The Legislature hereby finds and declares that the application of this section has been made unclear by the holding in *Petropoulos v. Department of Real Estate* (2006) 142 Cal.App.4th 554, and that the holding in that case has placed a significant number of statutes and regulations in question, resulting in potential harm to the consumers of California from licensees who have been convicted of crimes. Therefore, the Legislature finds and declares that this section establishes an independent basis for a board to impose discipline upon a licensee, and that the amendments to this section made by Chapter 33 of the Statutes of 2008 do not constitute a change to, but rather are declaratory of, existing law.

8. Section 118 of the Code states:

(a) The withdrawal of an application for a license after it has been filed with a board in the department shall not, unless the board has consented in writing to such withdrawal, deprive the board of its authority to institute or continue a proceeding against the applicant for the denial of the license upon any ground provided by law or to enter an order denying the license upon any such ground.

(b) The suspension, expiration, or forfeiture by operation of law of a license issued by a board in the department, or its suspension, forfeiture, or cancellation by order of the board or by order of a court of law, or its surrender without the written consent of the board, shall not, during any period in which it may be renewed, restored, reissued, or reinstated, deprive the board of its authority to institute or continue a disciplinary proceeding against the licensee upon any ground provided by law or to enter an order suspending or revoking the license or otherwise taking disciplinary action against the licensee on any such ground.

(c) As used in this section, "board" includes an individual who is authorized by any provision of this code to issue, suspend, or revoke a license, and "license" includes "certificate," "registration," and "permit."

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1 COST RECOVERY

2 9. Section 125.3 of the Code states:<sup>1</sup>

3 (a) Except as otherwise provided by law, in any order issued in resolution of a  
4 disciplinary proceeding before any board within the department or before the  
5 Osteopathic Medical Board, upon request of the entity bringing the proceeding, the  
6 administrative law judge may direct a licensee found to have committed a violation or  
7 violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable costs of the  
8 investigation and enforcement of the case.

9 (b) In the case of a disciplined licensee that is a corporation or a partnership, the  
10 order may be made against the licensed corporate entity or licensed partnership.

11 (c) A certified copy of the actual costs, or a good faith estimate of costs where  
12 actual costs are not available, signed by the entity bringing the proceeding or its  
13 designated representative shall be prima facie evidence of reasonable costs of  
14 investigation and prosecution of the case. The costs shall include the amount of  
15 investigative and enforcement costs up to the date of the hearing, including, but not  
16 limited to, charges imposed by the Attorney General.

17 (d) The administrative law judge shall make a proposed finding of the amount  
18 of reasonable costs of investigation and prosecution of the case when requested  
19 pursuant to subdivision (a). The finding of the administrative law judge with regard  
20 to costs shall not be reviewable by the board to increase the cost award. The board  
21 may reduce or eliminate the cost award, or remand to the administrative law judge if  
22 the proposed decision fails to make a finding on costs requested pursuant to  
23 subdivision (a).

24 (e) If an order for recovery of costs is made and timely payment is not made as  
25 directed in the board's decision, the board may enforce the order for repayment in any  
26 appropriate court. This right of enforcement shall be in addition to any other rights  
27 the board may have as to any licensee to pay costs.

28 (f) In any action for recovery of costs, proof of the board's decision shall be  
conclusive proof of the validity of the order of payment and the terms for payment.

(g) (1) Except as provided in paragraph (2), the board shall not renew or  
reinstate the license of any licensee who has failed to pay all of the costs ordered  
under this section.

(2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1), the board may, in its discretion,  
conditionally renew or reinstate for a maximum of one year the license of any  
licensee who demonstrates financial hardship and who enters into a formal agreement  
with the board to reimburse the board within that one-year period for the unpaid  
costs.

(h) All costs recovered under this section shall be considered a reimbursement  
for costs incurred and shall be deposited in the fund of the board recovering the costs  
to be available upon appropriation by the Legislature.

<sup>1</sup> Effective January 1, 2022, subdivision (k) of Section 125.3 (which exempted physicians and surgeons from the Board seeking recovery of the costs of investigation and prosecution), was repealed.

1 (i) Nothing in this section shall preclude a board from including the recovery of  
2 the costs of investigation and enforcement of a case in any stipulated settlement.

3 (j) This section does not apply to any board if a specific statutory provision in  
4 that board's licensing act provides for recovery of costs in an administrative  
5 disciplinary proceeding.

6 **FACTUAL SUMMARY**

7 10. At all times relevant to this First Amended Accusation, Respondent owned and  
8 operated a medical clinic located at 1601 West Avenue J, Suite 202, Lancaster, California.  
9 Respondent also owned Digital Perfection Corporation ("Digital Perfection"), which was located  
10 at the same address as Respondent's medical clinic.

11 11. At all times relevant to this First Amended Accusation, Star Home Health Resources,  
12 Inc. ("Star") was a home health agency located in La Verne, California.

13 12. In or around May 2008 through May 2016, Respondent conspired with at least four  
14 co-conspirators to refer Medicare beneficiaries to Star to receive home health services. Those  
15 services were then billed to Medicare by Star.

16 13. In exchange for the Medicare referrals, the owners and operators of Star paid  
17 Respondent a kickback of approximately \$100 to \$700 per Medicare beneficiary referral.

18 14. Star paid kickbacks to Respondent by providing cash payments and writing checks to  
19 Respondent's company, Digital Perfection.

20 15. Star kept track of the kickback payments by maintaining password-protected  
21 spreadsheets that listed each Medicare beneficiary referred to Star and the amount paid to  
22 Respondent, and other co-conspirators, for each patient referral.

23 16. On or about May 20, 2013, Respondent deposited \$2,000 cash into his account at  
24 California Bank and Trust, which represented kickbacks that Respondent received in exchange  
25 for referring Medicare beneficiaries to Star.

26 17. On or about September 16, 2013, Respondent deposited \$2,000 cash into his account  
27 at California Bank and Trust, which represented kickbacks that Respondent received in exchange  
28 for referring Medicare beneficiaries to Star.

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1 18. On or about April 10, 2014, Respondent deposited a check in the amount of \$3,500  
2 into an account for Digital Perfection at Bank of America, which represented kickbacks that  
3 Respondent received in exchange for referring Medicare beneficiaries to Star.

4 19. On or about October 24, 2015, Respondent deposited a check in the amount of \$5,600  
5 into an account for Digital Perfection at Bank of America, which represented kickbacks that  
6 Respondent received in exchange for referring Medicare beneficiaries to Star.

7 20. From about May 2008 to May 2016, Star billed Medicare approximately \$4,157,311  
8 based on bills for home health services to Medicare beneficiaries referred to Star, as the result of  
9 referrals from Respondent.

10 21. On or about June 29, 2017, in the case of *The United States of America v.*  
11 *Kanagasabai Kanakeswaran, M.D.*, United States District Court for the Central District of  
12 California; case number 17-CR-00410-PSG, Respondent was charged with violating Title 18,  
13 United States Code, section 371 (18 U.S.C. § 371), commonly known as Conspiracy to Pay and  
14 Receive Illegal Remunerations for Health Care Referrals, a felony. Respondent was also charged  
15 with 4 counts of violating Title 42, United States Code, section 1320a-7b, subdivision (b)(1)(A),  
16 (42 U.S.C § 1320a-7b(b)(1)(A)), commonly known as Receiving Illegal Remunerations for  
17 Health Care Referrals, each a felony.

18 22. On or about January 22, 2019, Respondent was convicted of violating one count of 18  
19 U.S.C. § 371, a felony, and four counts of 42 U.S.C. § 1320a-7b(b)(1)(A), each a felony.

20 23. On or about January 22, 2019, Respondent was sentenced to a forty-two (42) month  
21 prison term. Respondent was ordered to pay restitution in the amount of \$509,662 and a special  
22 assessment of \$500. Upon his release from prison, Respondent would be placed on supervised  
23 release for two (2) years. Respondent was also prohibited from being employed in any position  
24 that requires licensing and/or certification by any local, state, or federal agency without prior  
25 written approval of his Probation Officer.

26 24. On or about June 4, 2019, Respondent surrendered to the United States Penitentiary at  
27 Lompoc in Lompoc, California.

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
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**PRAYER**

3. Ordering Kanagasabai Kanakeswaran, M.D., to pay the Board costs of the investigation and enforcement of this case, and if placed on probation, the costs of probation monitoring; and
4. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
