19 **PARTIES**

20 1. William Prasifka (Complainant) is the Executive Director of the Medical Board of  
21 California (Board). He brought this action solely in his official capacity and is represented in this  
22 matter by Rob Bonta, Attorney General of the State of California, by Mary Cain-Simon,  
23 Supervising Deputy Attorney General.

24 2. ISSAC WEINTROUB, M.D. (Respondent) is representing himself in this proceeding  
25 and has chosen not to exercise his right to be represented by counsel.

26 3. On or about June 20, 1973, the Board issued Physician's and Surgeon's Certificate  
27 No. A 25287 to ISSAC WEINTROUB, M.D. (Respondent). The Physician's and Surgeon's  
28 Certificate expired on December 31, 2018, and has not been renewed.

18 **PARTIES**

19 1. William Prasifka (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in his official capacity  
20 as the Executive Director of the Medical Board of California, Department of Consumer Affairs  
21 (Board).

22 2. On June 20, 1973, the Board issued Physician's and Surgeon's Certificate Number A  
23 25287 to Issac Weintraub, M.D. (Respondent). The Physician's and Surgeon's Certificate expired  
24 on December 31, 2018, and has not been renewed.

25 **JURISDICTION**

26 3. This Accusation is brought before the Board, under the authority of the following  
27 laws. All section references are to the Business and Professions Code (Code) unless otherwise  
28 indicated.



1       4.    Section 2227 of the Code provides that a licensee who is found guilty under the  
2   Medical Practice Act may have his or her license revoked, suspended for a period not to exceed  
3   one year, placed on probation and required to pay costs of probation monitoring, or such other  
4   action taken in relation to discipline as the Board deems proper.

5       5.    Section 2234 of the Code provides that the Board shall take action against any  
6   licensee who is charged with "unprofessional conduct," which includes but is not limited to,  
7   "[v]iolating ... any provision of this chapter."

8       6.    Section 2236 of the Code provides that the conviction of any offense substantially  
9   related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a physician and surgeon constitutes  
10   unprofessional conduct.

11      7.    Section 2237 of the Code provides that the conviction of a charge of violating any  
12   federal statutes or regulations or any statute or regulation of this state, regarding dangerous drugs  
13   or controlled substances, constitutes unprofessional conduct.

14      8.    Section 2305 of the Code states:

15       "The revocation, suspension, or other discipline, restriction or limitation imposed by  
16   another state upon a license or certificate to practice medicine issued by that state, or the  
17   revocation, suspension, or restriction of the authority to practice medicine by any agency of the  
18   federal government, that would have been grounds for discipline in California of a licensee under  
19   this chapter [Chapter 5, the Medical Practice Act] shall constitute grounds for disciplinary action  
20   for unprofessional conduct against the licensee in this state.

21      9.    Section 802.1 of the Code provides that a physician charged with a felony must report  
22   the charge to the Medical Board within 30 days. The licensee must also report a conviction of  
23   any felony or misdemeanor within 30 days of the conviction

24      10.   Section 141 of the Code states:

25       "(a) For any licensee holding a license issued by a board under the jurisdiction of the  
26   department, a disciplinary action taken by another state, by any agency of the federal government,  
27   or by another country for any act substantially related to the practice regulated by the California  
28   license, may be a ground for disciplinary action by the respective state licensing board. A

1 certified copy of the record of the disciplinary action taken against the licensee by another state,  
2 an agency of the federal government, or another country shall be conclusive evidence of the  
3 events related therein.

4 “(b) Nothing in this section shall preclude a board from applying a specific statutory  
5 provision in the licensing act administered by that board that provides for discipline based upon a  
6 disciplinary action taken against the licensee by another state, an agency of the federal  
7 government, or another country.”

8  
9 **FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS**

10 **FIRST CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE**

11 **(Discipline, Restriction or Limitation Imposed by another State)**

12 11. On May 28, 2021, the State of New York Department of Public Health, State Board  
13 for Professional Medical Conduct issued a Determination and Order revoking Respondent’s  
14 license to practice medicine in the State of New York. The New York Order was issued after  
15 Respondent was convicted in the United States District Court, Central District of California of the  
16 felony crime of Conspiracy in violation of 18 U.S.C. Section 371. The Order revoking  
17 Respondent’s New York medical license followed an earlier order of Summary Action requiring  
18 Respondent to immediately cease practicing medicine.

19 12. The New York Determination and Order, and the Summary Action, both were based  
20 on and sustained the factual allegations in the Statement of Charges, which is part of Appendix I  
21 to the Determination and Order. The factual allegations included that Respondent’s conviction  
22 resolved allegations that beginning at least as early as May 2012 and continuing through at least  
23 June 2016, Respondent knowingly conspired and agreed to commit healthcare fraud by  
24 submitting fraudulent claims, which purported to be for medically necessary skilled services  
25 provided to home-bound patients; but the patients were not home-bound and were not confined to  
26 their homes and were not in need of these services.

27 13. Respondent’s conduct and the actions of the State of New York Department of Public  
28 Health, State Board for Professional Medical Conduct, as set forth in paragraphs 11-12, above,

1 constitute unprofessional conduct within the meaning of section 2305 and conduct subject to  
2 discipline within the meaning of section 141(a).

3 **SECOND CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE**

4 **(Criminal Conviction/ Failure to Report)**

5 14. On November 4, 2019, Respondent entered a guilty plea in the case of United States  
6 of America vs. Issac Weintroub, Docket Number 2:18-CR-00465-CAS-1, and was convicted of  
7 violating 18 U.S.C. Section 371, conspiracy to present fraudulent claims to Medicare.

8 Respondent pleaded guilty to a felony Information, which charged that beginning at least as early  
9 as May 2012 and continuing through at least June 2016, Respondent knowingly conspired and  
10 agreed to commit healthcare fraud by submitting fraudulent claims, which purported to be for  
11 medically necessary skilled services provided to home-bound patients; but the patients were not  
12 home-bound and were not confined to their homes and were not in need of those services.

13 Judgment was entered on November 4, 2019, and Respondent was ordered to pay restitution in  
14 the total amount of \$639,035.80. Respondent failed to report to the Board either the felony  
15 Information or his conviction.

16 15. Respondent's criminal conviction constitutes unprofessional conduct and the  
17 conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a physician  
18 and surgeon, as well as conviction of a charge of violating federal statutes, and is cause for  
19 discipline pursuant to Business and Professions Code sections 2234 and/or 2236 and/or 2237.

20 16. Respondent's failure to report either the filing of the Information or the criminal  
21 conviction in violation of section 802.1 constitutes unprofessional conduct and is cause for  
22 discipline pursuant to Business and Professions Code section 2234.



24 **PRAYER**

25 WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged,  
26 and that following the hearing, the Medical Board of California issue a decision:

27 1. Revoking or suspending Physician's and Surgeon's Certificate Number A 25287,  
28 issued to Respondent Issac Weintroub, M.D.;

- 1           2.    Revoking, suspending or denying approval of Issac Weintroub, M.D.'s authority to  
2 supervise physician assistants and advanced practice nurses;  
3           3.    Ordering Issac Weintroub, M.D., if placed on probation, to pay the Board the costs of  
4 probation monitoring; and  
5           4.    Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
